- 1) The total amount spent on youth services (not including school budgets) in each year since 2009-10?

Youth work in North Tyneside has always been delivered from a range of community based settings, with just one building which housed the youth service staff until it closed in 2016 and staff moved into a locality based buildings

- 3) The number of youth centres that have closed or been cancelled because of cuts to youth service budgets in each year since 2009-10?

We haven't closed any youth centres because of cuts, however, following a comprehensive review in 2015 we have redeveloped all our prevention and early help services into integrated locality teams and have, as result, now have staff who deliver a range of services to young people from community based facilities across the borough

We don't have youth service 'places' as all our services are openly accessible to all young people who want to access them
