	The borough does NOT look after the safety or quality of life of old, disabled and visually impaired residents. The roads are looked after but the pavements are ignored, so that the above group cannot get out of their homes for shopping and meeting others. A large number of us were stuck at home due to snow and ice on the pavements, just like all the previous years when we had snow. Falls were frequent and will continue to be a problem, just like previous years when it was totally ignored.	Comment referred to Environment, Housing and Leisure and Capita for further consideration.

9	In order to manage communities safely we need to develop effective constructive responses from housing in accommodating those that represent a significant risk in the community . Otherwise we force perpetrators who have predatory abusive behaviours to target those in the community who are vulnerable and susceptible to abusive behaviour i.e. women and children . The cost to all agencies responding to incidents is extremely costly and time consuming.	<p>In cases where the a person would not be qualify to go onto the housing register due to significant risk to the community, for example sex offenders the Council works with the responsible authority in securing suitable accommodation for those subject to a MAPPA arrangements.</p> <p>This was discussed at the August 2018 SNT Board meeting.</p>

10	We have no information of contacting other partners of the strategy Partnership other than the police. What is the government CONTEST ? I can not understand why, given the questions so far, anyone would disagree. Are we being asked the correct question in the correct manner?	Comment noted. CONTEST information is being developed and will be added to the SNT website in advance of the new Strategy being implemented.
11	Enable better access to housing for those with criminal convictions. Every day we struggle to get good housing for our offenders, who whilst they have no accommodation are at a greater risk of offending and causing harm. At present our offender are declined accommodation through the council so regularly have to end up in very poor quality private rented accommodation which is usually in a bad state of repair or unsafe. Alternatively they find themselves in a bed and breakfast/hostel which are not suitable for anyone.	There are no special rules regarding the allocation of housing to offenders, any offender who approaches the Council for help will be treated in the same way as anyone else who applies. This was discussed at the August 2018 SNT Board.
12	They need to look at children buying and using illegal substances on the streets, graffiti and major issues on bonfire night at keegan Park!	Refer comment for further consideration to Northumbria Police
13	Liaise with Northumbria police to ensure on foot officers are visible around the neighbourhood. Support community projects, Keegan Park in Killingworth is a neglected area which could be better used. At present it is unfit to use mainly due to broke glass everywhere from youths hanging around here on an evening. It would be lovely to see this space transformed into a usable and well maintained park. There are plenty of children in the area who would benefit from having somewhere safe to play. It was great when we had snow and all the neighbours were out sledging with their children on keegan park hills, it would be great if the kids could take advantage of this space in the spring and summer too. Child hood obesity and mental health issues are on the rise nationally as well as locally. Having a usable Park will help tackle both these issues by providing exercise, sun light and social opportunities. Resulting in a happier healthier community.	Residents should be encouraged to report issues when they arise to Envirolink as part of the communications messages already being promoted. A request has gone to our representative on the Addresses Causing Concern Group for further discussion on the nature and scale of the problem. A referral has also been made to the Love Your Street Campaign.
14	Redevelopment of Keegans Park Killingworth As a resident who lives near the park I am appalled at the amount of drug paraphernalia that litters the park and surrounding area. Its clear that the local youths use the area for drug use and I have previously found a flick knife in the park. The Board recognised that there are multiple priorities for housing allocations and a finite level of available properties.

18	Supporting local people to take ownership and control of their safety and the safety of their wider community	Comment referred to the Council's Community Engagement Team to consider and make recommendations to the SNT Board.
19	cigarette ends dumped on our streets, anti-social behaviour, bullying between children on our streets, safe access to our community centre's and clean up of our streets.	The Council's Communications Team promote these messages along with the newly enhanced Community Protection Team. SNT Board to ask partners to help with the promotion of messages.
20	Assess and work to address levels of Fear of Crime particularly for older people and other vulnerable groups in North Tyneside. From a 2017 Later Life survey conducted on line and by paper by Age UK North Tyneside between July and October 2017, Fear of Crime and anti-social behaviour was highlighted by 31% of 164 respondents as the key issue that older people said affected their quality of life living in North Tyneside.	SNT Board to consider how to tackle this in delivery of the new strategy.
21	We have seen a marked increase in crime in Whitley Bay in the last couple of months. Something needs to be done about this as it reflects badly on the area. It has also affected businesses and feel unsafe in my workplace, even during the day for fear of been mugged when leaving the shop for the takings or my employees been put at risk whilst working. The reality is that police presence is no longer full time in the Bay and we are not convinced response times are fast enough nor that we are represented as a community in terms of enforcement anymore.	Comment referred to Northumbria Police for further consideration. Dame Vera Baird addressed some of these concerns at full Council on 27 th September 2018.
22	In the Safeguarding section Sexual Assault and Domestic Violence should be included. In this questionnaire there should be an opportunity for comment after each section. A lot of this is like motherhood and apple pie - you can't disagree in principle. It's the detail that's important.	We have amended the Safeguarding section in the final Strategy to include specific references to Sexual Assault and Domestic Violence.
23	Engage with Highway colleagues and cabinet lead to remove rat run options and enable more cycling and walking.	Comment referred for further consideration to Transport Strategy Lead.
24	We are particularly concerned about the impact of austerity of services for victims of domestic and sexual abuse and exploitation. We would draw additional attention to the needs of children and young people affected by domestic abuse and their need for support to help them recover from these crimes.	Referred for further consideration and discussion with the Domestic Violence Coordinator. A report is due at the SNT Partnership in November 2018.
