Three questions posed:

- 1. Whether the Council has a clear view of what type of economy it is seeking to achieve in 10 or 20 years' time;
- Whether the existing wide range of activities to develop the local economy will have the desired effect in terms of delivering the Council's vision for the borough's economy;
- 3. The extent to which plans and strategies are likely to deliver inclusive growth, enabling as many people as possible to contribute and benefit from growth, identifying cold spots and ensuring people from these areas are included in economic growth through initiatives such as evaluating social value in procurement.

 - Recent LGA Peer Challenge also outlined the need to develop an Inclusive Economic Strategy

- Inward Investment
 - Proactively marketing the borough to support 1,000 jobs per annum
- Regeneration
 - Key industrial sites being regenerated to provide future workspace for energy & manufacturing – Swans, Swans CFI & Indigo Park
- Employability
 - Comprehensive employment and skills offer supports residents to secure employment and employers to address recruitment and skills needs
 - Programme of support to assist residents access the right employment
 - Advice, Training, Careers, Work experience & Apprenticeships

Whether the existing wide range of activities to develop the local economy will have the desired effect in terms of delivering the Council's vision for the borough's economy

- Business Start-up
 - NTC Business factory service supports 300 new business start-ups per annum
- Business Growth
 - One-to-one advice, consultancy & workshops to help businesses survive and thrive
 - Business Forum delivers events and a networking platform to support businesses working together
 - Annual programme of recruitment events including Cobalt and Quorum Jobs Fairs supports employers to maintain and grow their workforce
- Recognition from National Awards
 - Economic Growth, APSE, Enterprising Britain

- Local Industrial Strategy In development
- NTC Inclusive Economic Strategy To be developed

Strategic Economic Plan

- On target to achieve 100,000 jobs by 2024 (74k as at 3/19)
- 50+ workforce strategy in development
- Business scale up initiatives launched
- Working with employers on Better Health @ Work initiatives
- Mental Health Trailblazer piloted
- Encouraging apprenticeships



Other Activities to deliver 'Inclusive Growth':

- Ongoing action by the council and it's partners to tackle deprivation and to improve the life chances of our residents.
- Our Children and Young Peoples Plan aims to ensure young people receive the best education and are ready for work.
- Riverside and Chirton Partnership Board
- Wallsend and Howdon Partnership Board
- Both the Partneship Boards bring together voluntary and statutory bodies to tackle deprivation based on a place based approach



Other Activities to deliver 'Inclusive Growth':

- Council and partners access a wide range of funding to deliver IE projects and programme including:
- Adult Education Budget,
- Community and Family Learning,
- Apprenticeships,
- 16-19 Study Programmes,
- ESF Employabiltiy Projects Brighter Futures,
 Generation NE, Talent Match, Wise Steps, Moving on
 Tyne and Wear, Links to Work, North of Tyne Working
 Homes and Recruit Silverlink.

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Other Activities to deliver 'Inclusive Growth':

- We have accessed EU funding to delver schemes that reduce inequality and include:
 - Building Steps to a Brighter Future
 - Steps to Employment (Focus on 50+ workforce)
- We have 550 community and voluntary sector organisations which have accessed in excess of £50 to support residents of the borough
- Employment and Skills Team have:
 - A wide range of course including English and Maths, STEM and Digital Training
 - Working Homes project to support our tenants into active employment
- Connexions are supporting school pupils to understand and acceptive the right options when they leave education.

Ongoing activities through North of Tyne Combined Authority which includes:

 Control of the Adult Education Budget will enable funding to be specifically targeted towards skills and training in line with the emerging NoTCA Inclusive Economic Strategy.

 We are also working with partners such as Capita where they can target recruitment at hard to reach groups and provide opportunities to access employment.
