Key partners in this would the North East and North Cumbria Integrated Care Board, as commissioners for continuing healthcare clients - the fee levels set by the Authority are used as a basis for funding nursing placements and continuing healthcare (CHC) placements in care homes and CHC care packages in the community.

Ensuring sufficiency of supply and quality of provision is critical to support hospital discharge.

# 3. Evidence gathering and engagement What evidence has been used for this assessment?

### Internal evidence

Internal evidence from finance colleagues on the financial impact of costs within care services, specifically the changes to the national living wage (November 2024), the consumer price index (January 2025) and changes to the employers national insurance contributions (date 2024).

Alongside this, finance colleagues have been advising on cost impact in relation to the Council's Medium Term Financial Plan - demand led pressures and grant funding to support adult social care / market sustainability.

Our methodology takes account of the different settings in which care takes place. It is expected that the individuals with the highest level of need will be in bed based / building based services (ie care homes) and the cost model here is different to other community types of provision, ie home care, day services. For care homes the proportion of the split between staff related costs and non-staff related costs is 70:30, whereas for community provision this is 80:20. The calculation of the cost increase is reflective of different settings. The baseline costs for different settings and different client groups areas is different and takes count the complexity of different levels of need, staffing requirements, physical / cognitive / mental health needs of different client group areas. The fee increase is a % uplift on an already differentiated cost base for different services and types of support.

**External evidence** 

We have received information from a number of external care providers over the last three months on fee increases from 1 April 2025, alongside information from a number of representative organisations, including Care North East (North Tyneside). This information has set out their respective positions on cost impacts on their services, some of this is specific to services operating in North Tyneside and some of it is based on a wider footprint – depending on the scale of operation and other services they have in the region and nationally. Some of this is quite specific in relation to a percentage or cost increase needed and some is more general on the cost pressures being faced. All reference the changes to Employers National Insurance Contributions from 1 April 2025.

We wrote to ALL providers operating in North Tyneside on 4 February 2025 and requested they submit details of cost pressures on their services in North Tyneside. We received 51 responses and these have been analysed, reviewed and summarised under different care category groups and fed into the decision making process.

In addition to this we wrote to ALL providers on 24 February 2025, setting out our intentions and how we were to deal with different aspects of cost increase from 1 April 2025. We received 25 responses and these have been analysed, reviewed and summarised under different care category groups and fed into the decision making process.

We have information from other local authorities across the NE-ADASS regional group on how they are proposing to deal with fee increases to external providers, this allows us to benchmark our position in North Tyneside - note this is more for information only.

Greater impact on economically disadvantaged groups.

The Authority funds placements and care packages for those individuals that fall within the charging regulations and those that have capital / income levels below the nationally prescribed levels.

For older people in care homes, there are approx 30% of placements where they are self funding, ie people have capital avove the limit and do not rely on care funding from the Authority.

For home care and for services to support working age adults with a disability, the percentage levels are much lower.

People paying for their care directly are not included within this and the care provider is able to set a fee level that is generally higher than the Authority would pay and this will include the ability to include a higher % uplift.
