Newspapers are a valuable and often overlooked source. Not only do they provide useful additional information to events detailed in other records, but in some cases they can be the only source of information available. They can be especially useful for:



**Births, Deaths and Marriages:** Notices are often posted for each event but obituaries can also provide fuller accounts of people's lives and achievements.

**Legal Proceedings:** Newspapers often provide detailed reports of Quarter and Petty Sessions. They also report on Coroner's inquests, frequently providing more detail than a Coroner's record might have done and without being subject to closure periods.

**Photographs:** Newspaper reports often include photographs of important people and events which might not be available elsewhere.

**Businesses:** The activities of businesses were documented in the local press. New openings and closures, successes and failures were all reported by the newspapers which were also the main medium of advertising for many years.

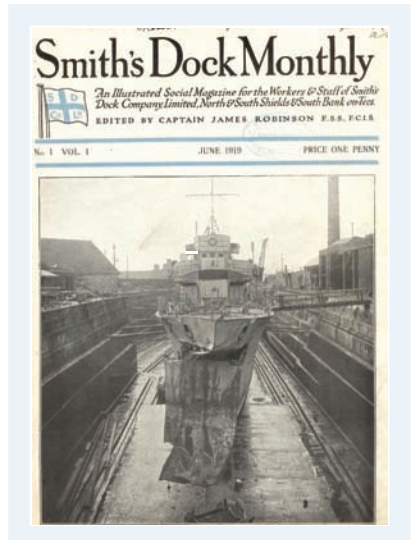
