Outstanding Children's Services!



Children's Services in our borough have been praised for 'an unwavering commitment to improving and enriching the lives of children and their families'

Ofsted inspectors have rated our children's services outstanding for the second consecutive time.

Achieving the highest possible rating of 'outstanding' in all areas for the first time means we are one of only five in the country to receive such an accolade.

Ofsted inspectors visited our teams in November 2024 and spent a week speaking to staff and those who access services and support children in care, including care leavers, foster carers, adopters and more.

And these conversations made it abundantly clear to inspectors that

children and families have access to services that 'improve their lives and wellbeing' in North Tyneside.

From an 'exceptional' early help service when needs are first identified, through to a 'meaningful' support offer for care leavers, inspectors noted that no matter the age, need or vulnerability of a child they receive the best support possible.

The glowing report celebrates the positive culture where social workers and all colleagues are supported to do their best for children, where staff feel supported, cared for and where their wellbeing is a priority.

We're proud of everyone involved.



Local icon restored to its former glory

One of North Tyneside's most loved landmarks, St Mary's Lighthouse is open after a major facelift, with full refurbishment and repair.

Built in 1898, St Mary's
Lighthouse was a crucial
navigational aid until it was
decommissioned in 1984.
Since then, it has taken on a
new role as a visitor centre,
attracting thousands of people
every year.

However, after decades of exposure to the wind and rain, the Grade II listed building was in much need of repair.

The project, which began in June and was completed in

October, involved re-painting the lighthouse, keeper's cottage, and the visitor centre. Significant repairs were carried out including fixing the stonework, replacing the glazing in the lantern, and replacing worn out windows and drainage systems.

The team worked with experts to make sure that both the lighthouse's heritage and the local ecology of the island were protected and undisturbed.

An ecologist monitored sound levels so the work didn't disrupt the local seals and birds.

By carefully timing the works around breeding and storm seasons, the island remained a haven for wildlife and the work was done as quickly and safely as possible.

Working on a historic listed building with lots of restrictions, 46m high in the air, accessible only at low tide, while keeping local wildlife happy, was quite a challenge for the team. Project Manager Ash Laycock said: "It was a once in a lifetime opportunity for us, and one of the most difficult projects I've managed, but the team and ecologists were amazing and we are delighted with how the lighthouse looks".

There are some exciting digital plans for lighthouse this year, which will make it an even better place to visit!





Our Budget: making sure we can invest and support

Every year we have to set a balanced budget. The spending decisions we make are based on our priorities for the Borough, which are set out in the Our North Tyneside Plan 2021-25. In this, we promise to support the most vulnerable residents and to invest in North Tyneside.

This year is the final year of our plan, and we're proud of what we've achieved. Our budget for 2025/26 allows us to continue delivering what's most important and necessary for our residents, supporting them to live healthy, secure and fulfilling lives.

Setting a balanced budget has been challenging this year. High demand for our social services, which support our vulnerable children and adults, is costing us more than ever. This is a problem faced by councils across the country.

We are meeting this challenge by saving and investing across all areas of the Council. We are watching what we spend and making better use of external funding to support our services and the regeneration of our towns and villages.

The budget has provision for an additional £2m next year to fix roads and pavements in poor condition.

It enables more affordable homes to be built and to make our estates cleaner and safer.

We will continue trying to get the best value for money with our savings and investment programme.

However, to do this and to continue providing the services and amenities people rely on and enjoy, we've had to make some difficult decisions.

It is necessary to increase our Council Tax this year by 4.99%. This will raise a much-needed £7m, and it is what the Government expects us to do.

To help with this, we are continuing with our local Council Tax Support Scheme and Tenancy Sustainment

Fund to support our council housing tenants.

Details about support available for residents are on the opposite page. The budget supports the Council's ambition to be carbon-net zero by 2030, and supports our priorities to make the Borough an even greater place to live, work and visit.

What about my Council Tax bill?

Council Tax bills will increase by 4.99% in April.

This is how much the Government expects all local authorities to increase bills by when it provides funding.

This means an extra £64.65 for Band A properties and £96.98 for Band D properties.




A listening Council


We are proud to be a Council that listens to and works with our communities.

Our Ambition for the North West

Our Ambition for the North West is creating attractive places to live, new opportunities for work and business, and inspiring spaces to play and visit.



Killingworth Lakeside Park

This is being developed into a destination park for locals and visitors with ecology-friendly landscaping. There will be a new play site, better parking, new entrance features, and improved cycle and pedestrian routes.

Tree maintenance work has been carried out to help with biodiversity. Extensive tree and shrub planting and wildflower seeding is now taking place.



Waggonways

The historic waggonways network that connects the North West villages is getting a refresh. Surfaces and drainage will be upgraded to make the routes more accessible, with better connections from nearby villages. Seating areas, signage and information boards will be added, along with nature and heritage trails.



Village plans

We have been consulting with residents on village plans for Killingworth, Annitsford, Dudley, Fordley, Camperdown, Burradon, Wideopen and Seaton Burn. Village plan projects include new signage, landscaping, and opportunities for public art at the main entrances of each village.



There will be improvements to Fryer's Millennium Green in Burradon and Keegan Park in Killingworth, and support for the Friends of Annitsford Pond group.

There will be a focus on pride of place, with environmental services working to support housing estates, tackling litter and removing weeds.

Access to services such as adult education will be improved, and we will explore if a community banking initiative can be developed.

Transport plans

The transport strategy for the North West of the Borough will bring together transport operators, the voluntary sector and other partners to improve public transport links, improve active travel routes and explore options for cleaner and shared vehicles.

Inner area plans

Plans for the North West inner area, which covers Forest Hall, West Moor, Benton, Longbenton, Palmersville and Holystone are being drawn up. We will consult residents on these soon.

Our Ambition for Wallsend



New roof for Segedunum

Work is now well underway on essential works at Segedunum Roman Fort and Museum that will transform the visitor experience.

Following an application we submitted earlier this year, the North East Combined Authority has contributed £499,000 from its UKSPF allocation to help allow us to install a new roof.

This investment, on top of the £499,000 secured from Arts Council England's MEND fund and over £650,000 from the Council, will fund a new roof for the World Heritage Site's museum, replacing the current roof that is reaching the end of its life.

The new roof will accommodate a new ventilation system to provide a more stable indoor temperature and humidity, making the museum more comfortable for staff and visitors, as well as the exciting prospect of being able to borrow and display artefacts from other museums, such as the British Museum, with the assurance that they would be safe in Segedunum.



Improving connections in Wallsend

We're continuing to progress with our plans to create a vibrant and connected Wallsend and we are delighted to have completed a key part of our work in improving walking and cycling connections between Segedunum leading to the bus/Metro station and the High Street.

The project has seen a new active travel route created between the two areas, with improvements to footpaths on Wooley Street, Winifred Gardens and Maude Gardens connecting High Street West to the bus and Metro stations to A187 Buddle Street. And the Winifred Gardens children's playground area now has new equipment as well as a new play surface.

There is a new crossing point for pedestrians and cyclists giving quicker and easier access to Segedunum Roman Fort and Museum, as well as connecting to the National Cycle Route (NCN 72).

Further work is still to be carried out, with some improvements to the appearance and biodiversity of the route and some further landscaping and planting.

The new paving also provides a high-quality backdrop to the approach to Segedunum Museum and the Fort.

Our Ambition for North Shields

Riverside Embankment Walkway opens to the public

North Shields Riverside Embankment Walkway has opened to the public.

The walkway links North Shields town centre with the bustling Fish Quay, providing step-free access with route options to suit different needs.

The project has created an attraction in its own right, with stunning views of the Tyne, attractive landscaping and an exciting public artwork coming soon.

Funding for the scheme was provided by the North East Combined Authority from the region's Transforming Cities Fund. The work was carried out by our contractor Willmott Dixon.

The Riverside Embankment Walkway has been designed with environmental sustainability and safety at its heart, providing benefits for health and wellbeing, and vastly improving the appearance of the local landscape. The planting will flourish to its full potential during the spring and summer months.

An official event will be held later this year to mark the installation of a sculpture depicting escaped enslaved woman Mary Ann Macham, who fled America by stowing away on a ship and settled in North Shields. The sculpture by artist Keith Barrett will show Mary Ann breaking out of chains.

Major improvements for Bedford Street

Work is underway on a major scheme of improvements for one of the busiest streets in North Shields.

Bedford Street is getting smart new paving, mature trees and modern seating to create an attractive, high-quality finish.

The pedestrian area will be extended along the length of the street, with access for emergency and maintenance vehicles only. The new layout will improve safety and create extra outside space for café seating, other business use and events.

The project is funded by the North East Combined Authority, Active Travel England and the Government. The work is being done by our construction partner Capita.

Access to all shops is being maintained throughout the works and Bedford Street remains open for business.

The Beacon Centre multi-storey remains the best parking option for shoppers, and there are drop-off areas in Wellington Street and West Percy Street.

We are helping to grow the creative economy of North Shields, supported by the North East Combined Authority.

North Tyneside Music Education Hub musicians

North Tyneside Music Education Hub

North Tyneside Music Education Hub has moved into the Business Centre on Saville Street, bringing young musicians into the heart of North Shields Cultural Quarter.

It's in a prime position for exciting collaborations, with neighbours including Helix Arts, the Globe Gallery, the Exchange 1856 and King Street Social Club.

Joint projects are being planned including performances, mentoring, behind-the-scenes music technology training and the chance to shadow professional musicians during gigs at local venues.

A Get Into Music careers event was held in January at The Exchange 1856 for students from John Spence, Kings Priory, Norham and Marden high schools.



The hub offers a wide range of free musical activities for young musicians of all ages and standards.

We are the lead partner for a regional Music Hub consortium, delivered by Arts Council England on behalf of the Department for Education.

Creative writing sessions

Free creative writing courses funded by us are heading into a new chapter thanks to Age UK North Tyneside.

Creative writing service Write on the Tyne CIC is run by author Helen Aitchson, who ran sell-out courses at North Shields Library and Exchange 1856 during 2024.

Some of the learners were Age UK North Tyneside customers, and the charity has now offered a free teaching space for future sessions

Celebrating North Shields

past, present and future.

2025 marks the 800th anniversary of North Shields. An exciting year of celebrations is planned, with something for everyone.



The North Shields story

800 years ago, a small village made up of simple huts called shiels was founded on the north bank of the Tyne where the Fish Quay stands today.

Created in around 1225 as a fishing port to serve Tynemouth Priory, it grew into the thriving harbour of North Shields.

Today North Shields and its surrounding neighbourhoods are home to around 35,000 people.



Blessing of the Fleet:

On 20 June, North Shields Fishermen's Heritage Project will bring a procession of school children with pipers to the Fish Quay. Joined by a parade of boats on the river and a blessing of the fleet with The Fishermen's Mission, celebrating the fishing heritage of the town.



Throughout 2025

1225 Exhibition: Based at the Old Low Light Heritage Centre, a new permanent exhibition will explore the history of North Shields from 1225 to the present day.

North Shields Murals Project: Working with artists to create a series of high-quality public murals that capture the history and spirit of the town.

I Love North Shields: Magazine editions dedicated to North Shields' 800th anniversary made by and for the community of North Shields.

North Shields Voices: A community archive project by Remembering The Past, capturing a snapshot of life in North Shields in 2025.

North Shields: 800 Years of Harmony: A music film documentary celebrating the rich musical heritage of North Shields, with musician Liam Fender and local performers.

The Flight Home: An art trail featuring life size herring gulls, each decorated by community groups to reflect the history, heritage and culture of North Shields.

Emerging Music Talent: Events in local venues celebrating the emerging young music talent in North Shields.

Employment and Skills brings job successes

Our Employment and Skills service offer an all-age careers service combined with learning opportunities and skills training to help anyone in the Borough to gain and stay in good quality work?

Each year, our Adult Learning
Service delivers up to 3,500
enrolments and our Connexions
team complete approximately
5,500 interventions with young
people. Since opening our first
Working Well Hub in 2022,
we've expanded the service to
locations across the Borough
and assisted over 15,000 visitors
with free, confidential

employment advice at our two core hubs in North Shields and Wallsend.

Supporting young people in North Tyneside, our Connexions team has recorded a NEET (Not in Education, Employment or Training) rate below the regional and national averages at 2.6%. For adults completing training with our Adult Learning Service over 770 participants secured work in 2023-24 and our Working Well team supported over 1,400 residents to find work with over 350 employers.





Your vote is important.

Polling stations will be open on 1 May from 7am to 10pm.

Remember: If you want to vote you must be on the Electoral Register. If you are not registered you can make an application to register online at www.gov.uk/register-to-vote

You will need your National Insurance number and date of birth. If you are unsure whether you are registered, please contact us.

If you want to vote by post, you can apply for a postal vote at www.gov.uk/apply-postal-vote

If you want to appoint a proxy to vote on your behalf, you can apply at www.gov.uk/apply-proxy-vote

Support for disabled voters

We are committed to supporting disabled people to vote in elections and can support disabled voters in a number of ways:

- In addition to being able to vote by post, disabled voters can register to vote by proxy.
- Every polling station will have an accessible entrance and a wheelchair-accessible polling booth.
- Large print sample ballot papers and tactile voting devices are available to assist voters with visual impairments.
- Someone can help you vote if you need them to. This can be the Presiding Officer at your polling station, a family member, friend or support worker, as long as they are 18 years old or over.
- Polling station staff can give you a tour of the station before you vote so you can familiarise yourself with the station.

In certain circumstances, where you have an emergency that means you cannot go to the polling station in person, you can apply for an emergency proxy up to 5pm on the day of the poll. For more information, please contact Electoral Services.

Poll cards

We will deliver poll cards to all registered electors from the end of March. Where you vote in person, your poll card will tell you where your polling station is. You do not need your poll card to vote but it is helpful to take it along to the station with you.

Check the location of your polling station on your card as it may have changed since the last time you voted.

If you cannot go to the polling station on Thursday I May or would prefer not to, you can do one of the following:

- Apply to vote by post online at www.gov.uk/apply-postal-vote
- Apply to vote by proxy (this means someone else can vote on your behalf) - www.gov.uk/apply-proxy-vote

If you can't apply online, you can request an absent vote application form by contacting Electoral Services on 0191 643 2270 or by email at elections@northtyneside.gov.uk

When will you get your postal voting papers?

Postal votes will be delivered in two stages:

- From Thursday 17 April postal vote packs will be sent to current postal voters and those who apply for a postal vote before 23 March
- From Tuesday 22 April postal vote packs will be sent to anyone who applies for a postal vote between 24 March and the deadline on 14 April

If they do not arrive you can get a replacement ballot paper, from Electoral Services up until 5pm on polling day. Please contact us to arrange this. Please remember to send back your completed postal vote as early as possible. If you haven't received your postal ballot pack by **25 April**, contact us. We can then check you are registered to receive a postal vote and issue a replacement if necessary.

I've spoilt / lost my ballot papers / postal voting statement. What should I do?

If you have spoilt your ballot papers, please contact us so that we can advise on any action required.

Remember, if you have applied to vote by post, you cannot vote in person at a polling station.

The rules around handing in postal votes have changed. If you are handing your postal vote into any Council building or polling station, you will be required to complete a short form.

You can also only hand in a maximum of five postal votes plus your own.



In just 18 months, our Neat Streets team has removed 766 tons of waste from streets across North Tyneside, including fly-tipped items, litter, leaves, and green waste.

This is part of our ongoing effort to keep the borough clean and safe for everyone who lives here. Since launching in August 2023, the initiative has focused on finding the best, most efficient ways to serve the community. With three vans and four team members in each, we're able to respond more quickly and make a bigger impact on street cleanliness.

But it's not just about waste removal. Neat Streets works closely

with other Council teams to lend a helping hand to vulnerable and elderly residents, ensuring no one is left behind.

By staying proactive and engaged with local communities, we're proud to help improve the quality of life for everyone in North Tyneside. We have more sessions planned, look out for the team in your area.

E-waste scheme is a big success – thanks to you!

Thanks to the support of our residents, the Recycle Your Electricals project has collected over 9.5 tonnes of small electricals in just one year — 43% more than the year before. This includes the equivalent of 4,731 toasters, which were recycled instead of going to general waste, and we collected and recycled over 12,000 vapes.

With £14,000 secured from Material Focus, we've introduced 65 electrical recycling points and 29 vape recycling tubes across the borough, including Council buildings, schools, and community centres. Given its success, we're pleased to make the scheme a permanent part of our operations.

Our project is one of over 40 UK initiatives funded by Material Focus, part of the Recycle Your Electricals campaign. We're proud to join councils across the country in making it easier for 10 million UK residents to recycle electricals.

Anything with a plug, battery, or cable can be recycled and turned into something new. Items like toasters, kettles, hairdryers, and irons can be dropped off at locations across the

Borough. Just remember to remove and recycle batteries separately, as they shouldn't be thrown in the bin. Batteries can ignite during collection or sorting, so please dispose of them safely.

New recycling trial aims to curb electrical waste



Starting in Spring 2025, we will be trialling a new service to collect broken or unwanted small electricals from residents' homes.

Residents can request a collection for up to five electricals, which will be collected from their doorsteps and given a new lease of life through a community initiative known as a repairs club.

Recharge, hosted by Whitley Bay Big Local, is an inclusive repairs club where everyone is welcome to come along, make new friends, and learn new skills. A qualified electrical engineer will supervise each session, teaching attendees valuable practical skills while ensuring all electrical items are safe for redistribution.

The best part? Once repaired, the electrical items will be redistributed back into the community, ready for reuse.

This trial is one of over 40 UK projects funded by Material Focus, the not for profit leading the Recycle Your Electricals campaign. North Tyneside is joining other projects around the country in making it easier for 10 million

UK residents to recycle their electricals.

It follows the successful introduction of small electricals recycling boxes and vape tube collection points across the Borough, in which more than 9.5 tonnes of small electricals were collected over 12 months. The scheme has now been made a permanent part of the Council's operations.

We will announce further details about the new collection service in the coming months.

Think before you bin your batteries

Batteries thrown into household waste and recycling bins can cause fires in bin lorries and at waste sites, putting workers and firefighters at risk.


A recent fire at a local waste facility was caused by an incorrectly disposed battery — thankfully, no one was hurt.
But the problem is escalating across the UK.

In May 2024, Recycle Your Electricals and the Fire Chiefs Council revealed that battery fires in the waste system had reached record levels, with lithium-ion batteries discarded in household rubbish bins responsible for over 1,200 fires in 12 months—up from 700 in 2022.

A survey of local authorities across the UK found that 94% had seen an increase in fires caused by batteries in the waste stream, highlighting a growing challenge.

The message is simple: never put batteries in your bins. Instead, take them to a dedicated collection point at supermarkets, shops, public buildings, or the Household Waste Recycling Centre.

Carbon Gold Award

Another two North Tyneside organisations have been rewarded for reducing their carbon footprint, helping to make the Borough cleaner and greener for us all.

The NBT Group in Camperdown, which uses technology to help businesses with their supply chains, and the Earsdon and Wellfield Community Association have both been given 'Gold' Carbon Reduction Awards.

Launched in 2023, the awards recognise organisations who are committed to reducing their carbon footprint, in line with our own aims to be carbon net zero by 2030.

The NBT Group has reduced their carbon footprint by 31.5% by:

- · Streamlining deliveries and reducing long distance runs
- · Amending lighting and heating plans
- · Reducing paper usage
- No longer using plastic liners in office bins
- Making staff aware of carbon emissions

The NBT Group isn't stopping there though... they've plans to become carbon neutral and even carbon positive.



The Earsdon and Wellfield Community Association has reduced their carbon footprint by 28% by:

- Installing heat recovery ventilation systems
- Programming individual rooms to be warm only when in use
- · Lowering the temperature of rooms if physical activity is taking place
- · Rearranging schedules so multiple rooms aren't being used at different times of the day for short periods

Work on the second phase of the Seafront Sustainable Route is progressing well and while there's still more to do, we are getting closer to completion.

The project is on track to be completed this summer, and the result will be a seafront that is safer, more accessible and more attractive for everyone.

Our teams are working hard to continue this great progress and keep disruption to residents and businesses in the area to a minimum. As we approach the end of the scheme, some temporary traffic management will be needed to complete each section safely.

Multi-directional traffic lights will be temporarily in place at key locations from Marden Avenue to Eskdale Terrace. A temporary one-way system will be in place for northbound traffic only.

Southbound vehicles will need to divert on to Park Avenue, just after Spanish City, with signage at York Road guiding motorists towards Cullercoats or the Coast Road.

All temporary traffic management measures will be removed as soon

as practically possible and before completion of the project.

Funded by the Department for Transport's Active Travel Fund and Sustrans and with Capita handling the construction, the project is a key part of our commitment to reach carbon net-zero by 2030. It promotes sustainable travel options that benefit everyone while protecting the environment.



Patching works

Our annual patching and resurfacing works are currently taking place across North Tyneside.

Based on feedback from residents and inspectors, as well as our own condition data and checks, we recently completed our annual programme of patching works. Patching involves repairing damaged areas on the surface of a road and will help to keep our roads safe and minimise damage.

The resurfacing programme is currently underway and a number of streets have already been fully resurfaced.

Work will take place on more streets this spring, and you may have received a letter about works coming up or seen resurfacing taking place in your local area.

This part of a wider programme of work aimed at making roads safer for residents and businesses.

We appreciate the support and cooperation of residents and businesses affected while we carry out this work.

In an effort to keep disruption to a minimum, the majority of these works will be carried out off-peak where possible, with local diversions in place where necessary. Residents or businesses in nearby areas will receive letters with information from the contractor carrying out the work on our behalf.



Encouraging sustainable travel in North Tyneside

We're always looking for ways to ensure people feel safe travelling in the Borough when out on bikes or walking.

This is part of our wider plan to grow sustainable transport in North Tyneside and make the Borough safer and greener.

Our Sustainable Transport Team do a lot of work in schools and residential areas around encouraging behaviour change in every day travel.

This includes providing and promoting realistic sustainable

travel opportunities, or looking at physical changes to streets near schools that would make it easier and safer for young people and their families to get to where they need to be.

Condensation, damp and mould in your home

We are committed to ensuring that our tenants live in safe and healthy homes, and that includes ensuring you know how to prevent, treat or report condensation, damp and mould in your own home.

Colder weather can lead to an increase in condensation, damp and mould in homes.

Make sure you check:

- · your heating and radiators
- · blocked or broken gutters
- ventilation, such as kitchen and bathroom fans.

We also have guidance on the different types of condensation, damp and mould and self-help videos on how to clean them available on our website.

If you're a Council tenant and your property needs a repair, you can call us on 0345 2000 102.

If you are living in a private rented property then your landlord has a legal duty to ensure your home is free of hazards, and this includes damp and mould. Your landlord should regularly inspect your property and remedy any deficiencies promptly. You should also report any disrepair to your landlord to allow them to carry out repairs.

Tenancy and Financial Support

Our Tenancy and Financial Support Service is always available for Council tenants who may be struggling and need a bit of a helping hand.

Since its introduction, the service has helped over 280 tenants access a combined total of over £500,000 in benefits, to an average of £1,900 per tenant.

Located within Crossgates Extra Care scheme, those staying in the flat will have the privacy of their own space while benefiting from the care and support on offer.
