1	Burradon Tower	SAM 32054	The monument includes the remains of Burradon Tower, which are situated immediately east of the main farmhouse of Burradon Farm. Burradon Tower, which is listed Grade II, is a three storey tower house, with a single chamber on each floor reached by a newel stair in the south east corner. It is constructed of sandstone blocks. 2	Clifford's Fort	SAM 44	The monument includes the remains of Clifford's Fort, erected in 1672 to accommodate guns for the defence of the Tyne. It formed part of an extensive programme of coastal fortifications to protect England against the Dutch. 3	Enclosure 540m NE of Burradon House	SAM 8	Enclosure (crop mark).	Unknown
4	Tynemouth Castle/Priory/iron age site (including the monk stone)	SAM 25165	The monument includes the remains of an Iron Age and Romano-British settlement, a pre-conquest and a post-conquest monastery, a ninth century wayside cross, a possible Norman motte, an enclosure castle, an artillery castle and 19th and 20th century coastal defences. A monastery is thought to have been established at Tynemouth by the mid- seventh century AD when it is believed that the body of St Oswin was interred here.	24 Nov 1932, amended 16 May 1997
5	Hadrian's Wall (1) Segedunum Fort	SAM 28(1)	Hadrian's Wall in Wall Mile 0, Roman Fort, Segedunum, Buddle Street	Unknown
6	Hadrian's Wall (2)	SAM 28(2)	Hadrian's Wall in Wall Mile 0, two sections of Hadrian's Wall between Sharpe Road and The Avenue.	Unknown
7	Church of Holy Cross	SAM 32053	The monument includes the remains of Holy Cross Church, situated on the top of a spur, which is bounded to the north, west and south by a deep ravine through which the Wallsend Burn flows. The visible remains of the church, which is Listed Grade I, include a chancel, nave, porch and associated graveyard. The first reference to a church at Wallsend is in the late 12th century. 8	West Backworth Medieval Settlement	SAM 32067	The monument includes the remains of West Backworth medieval village, 300m south east of West Farm, Backworth. The monument includes both medieval earthwork and below ground remains and the remains of post-medieval activity which overlie them in places.	24 Sep 1999
